Summer Math Enrichment Requirement

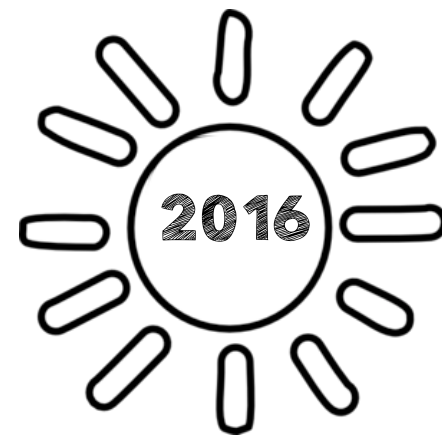
Your child has had a busy year learning new math skills. Mastery of these skills is extremely important in order to develop a solid math foundation. Next year's math program will add onto these skills so any time over the summer spent learning or reinforcing these concepts will be very beneficial for your child. Each year's math instruction builds upon the previous year's math skills.

Our summer requirement for math enrichment will be completed through IXL. You may access the login information for IXL through your child's current math teacher.

Your child will be required to complete, on average, three IXL lessons per week. Your child should choose one lesson per letter subsection for the grade that they have just completed. For example, your incoming second grade child may choose to complete any one first grade lesson from section A, any one first grade lesson from section B, and any one first grade lesson from section C during week the first week of summer. They will continue throughout the alphabet until they complete one lesson per letter up until the letter Z. By the end of the summer, you will have completed 26 lessons.

Grade for Summer Math Enrichment Requirement

By the end of the first week of school, your child's math teacher will check that your child has completed this summer requirement. These completed IXL lessons will be counted for a grade at the end of the first week of school.

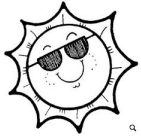

 As summer vacation approaches, students will be enjoying their time off with some "fun in the sun"! This is also a great time to catch up on some reading. In this brochure you will find the guidelines for summer reading and math requirements.



Summer Reading Requirement

All students will be **required to read for 45 minutes, on average, weekly**. They may complete this requirement using an interactive online reading program called **myOn**.

Getting Started on myOn

To get started, visit the website **myOn.com**. Simply login using the following:

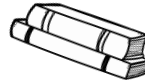
**The students in each grade level with the most minutes of reading on myOn will be awarded a certificate and a special lunch with administration for their achievement at the beginning of the school year

Journal Requirement

After your child finishes reading a book on myOn, he or she will write a reflection of that book in a journal. The journal may be a composition book, spiral notebook, or folder with paper.

- Students entering kindergarten or 1st grade may draw a picture to accompany any writing he or she can produce.
- Students entering 2nd-8th grade will write a one page summary and reflection of the book they read in a journal.

By the end of the summer, students should have at least **eight entries** that show their thoughts on their favorite reading throughout the summer.



Grade for Summer Reading Requirement

This journal should be turned in the first week of school to the ELA teacher. This journal and the 45 minutes of reading, on average, weekly, will be counted for a grade at the beginning of the school year.

Note: If your child has limited access to technology during the summer or would prefer to read a physical book, he or she may read any book they choose. The child should write the title of this book in his or her journal. A parent should sign off in the journal that he or she read for the 45 minutes during the week. The child should still write the summary and reflection of the book in his or her journal.
